From the Director

Long before our incorporation in 1990, Project Safe existed as a network of volunteer safe homes. Our founders opened their homes to strangers so that people with nowhere else to go could escape the horror of abuse. Today we ask ourselves as an organization, "What is the equivalent act of courage that we must do to end violence against women?" These words are a paraphrase of a conversation the board and I had some years ago during a planning retreat. I've written them on our annual report every year since, and think about them almost every day.

Without these words as a touchstone it would be so easy to drown in the details of our work. Bills must be paid, letters written, repairs made and the hotline answered. Each day brings new women and children, terrifying accounts of abuse, boring meetings and new frustrations and disappointments. But each day also brings another opportunity to make change, to inspire an intern or volunteer, empower a survivor or affect a policy. Each day brings us another step closer to the end of violence against women.

Only time will tell if we're as courageous as our foremothers, but we honor their work and sacrifice by trying every day.



Community Workshops

Project Safe has begun to offer Saturday workshops for victims and survivors of domestic violence in the community. One recent offering was an expressive arts project jointly facilitated by staff and volunteers. In that workshop, participants created a beautiful and moving canvas which is now displayed in the Family Protection Center. The participants also designed t-shirts to contribute to the "Clothesline Project", an on-going art installation which eloquently relays stories of abuse and survival.

The workshop began with a professionally guided warm-up and then transitioned into a series of writing and sketching exercises designed to stimulate creativity and imagination. This became a journal in which the participants could take with them as a memory, or for future artistic exploration. The environment was structured yet nurturing, allowing the experiential nature of artistic process to unravel and unfold without distraction, encouraging an expansive range of self-transformation. The participants were able to find themes, colors, and patterns in their work which helped them to create poems and images which were then transferred as a group to the canvas. They were encouraged throughout the workshop to share their work and feelings with the group as often as needed. There was a powerful sense of trust and support within the group. After a delicious lunch donated by a local church organization, the participants worked together to design the layout of the canvas using the journals they had created in the beginning. The facilitators provided basic art instruction in case there were participants with no prior art experience. From then on, they worked diligently, bringing the canvas to life as a testament to their experiences of survival. Throughout the duration of the workshop, the participants were also encouraged to use their images and pieces

of writing to individually create a t-shirt for the "Clothesline Project". Much of the inspiration for the t-shirts also came from the initial brainstorming exercises.

At the end of the workshop, we gathered and engaged in the "harvesting" process in which discussed the experience of art making and what we learned from it. It was a wonderful experience both for participants and facilitators. There was a powerful sense of strength within the community. Every member of the workshop participated fully and how much to contribute. It was an inspiring day filled with much laughter and hope.

Following the success of the art workshop, Project Safe will host an assertiveness workshop in February. This workshop will examine the continuum from passive to assertive to aggressive behavior through various exercises and activities, and will finish with a workout at Barnett Tae Kwon Do Academy. Approximately 10 years ago, a young woman's body was pulled from the Oconee River. It was later discovered that the woman's boyfriend and father of her unborn child was responsible for her murder. Five years ago, a woman was gunned down in her east Athens home by her live-in boyfriend, while her teenage daughter was down the hall. A mother of two children was murdered just two months ago.

Domestic violence fatalities occur daily across the U.S., and Athens Clarke County has not been unaffected. In an effort to prevent future tragedies, Project Safe initiated a fatality review panel for Clarke and Oconee counties. In December 2003, Project Safe hired a fatality review coordinator to begin researching domestic violence homicide cases as far back as the early 1990s. Tthese cases are examined by Project Safe and other members of the Domestic Violence Task Force in order to coordinate a better community response to domestic violence situations.

We've learned many things from these reviews, including risk factors for homicide and opportunities for community members to intervene. For example, a common theme among the homicide perpetrators was a history of suicidal thoughts or a completed suicide. The research also showed that numerous victims had seen a physician for previous injuries or prenatal care. Project Safe has worked to implement many recommendations of the fatality review panel in hopes that future fatalities can be prevented. For example, Project Safe staff has educated healthcare providers on ways to screen and assess patients for domestic violence. Staff also review police reports of domestic violence incidents and call the victims to offer services and check on their safety. With the help of other agencies, Project Safe will continue its efforts to educate the community on domestic violence to make Athens Clarke County a safer environment for all its residents.

Superheroes Starting in Spring

Did you know that male children who witness domestic violence are 3 times more likely to abuse their partners as adults? And the risk of sexual abuse is 7 times greater for girls whose fathers batter their mothers. Early intervention helps. That's why Project Safe is creating a new support group called Superheroes for children who've witnessed intimate partner violence. Targeting children ages 5-10, the group will meet weekly from February 4 to April 21, 2008. Each meeting will be a high-energy mix of art, music, dance, games and puppetry. The activities are specifically designed to alleviate guilt, improve self esteem, manage emotions and develop skills related to safety, assertiveness and abuse prevention.

The group will be limited to 10 children, and participants will need to commit to attending each session. Screening interviews are already underway, and several children (including a few sibling groups) have already been registered.

In keeping with the theme that each child is a Superhero, members of the Cotton Patch Quilt Guild are creating one-of-a-kind superhero capes for each participant. Other volunteers are needed to assist the facilitators as we will have a 1:1 adult to child ratio for each group. Update on Sexual Assault Services

In just over four months of handling services for the Sexual Assault Center, Project Safe has answered 53 hotline calls from sexual assault survivors seeking support, reassurance and services. We've also provided medical exam accompaniment, counseling, transportation, financial assistance and in-person follow up for many additional survivors in Clarke and surrounding counties.

After the Sexual Assault Center of Northeast Georgia announced its plans to dissolve after 34 years, Project Safe immediately took steps to ensure that services would be available. Our staff have been cross trained in sexual assault, and volunteers have also received extensive training.

The Sexual Assault Center is in the process of reopening, and has recently hired a new Executive Director and three other staff positions. Project Safe will continue to provide hotline, crisis accompaniment, advocacy, support, follow up services, short term individual counseling and emergency financial assistance for adult victims of sexual assault until January 2nd, when it is expected that the Center will be fully operational.
