From the Director

It feels like we do a great deal to bring attention to Project Safe and the problem of domestic violence, and Athens just isn't that big so sometimes I get thrown by the questions people who haven't heard about us sometimes ask. One of my favorites is, "Being the Director of Project Safe, is that a real job?" (Answer: Feels like one). Another favorite, "Do you work full time?" (Answer: Yes, and then some!). But one of the hardest questions I'm asked is, "So what does Project Safe do?" Ok, so it's not really hard. I have my pat answer about shelter and services for victims of domestic violence. Give me 30 more seconds and I mention crisis intervention, prevention & education, ongoing support and systems change all to reduce and ultimately eliminate domestic violence. What's challenging is trying to answer that question accurately in a short amount of time. When people ask me that, I want to share stories that capture the generosity and caring of our staff and volunteers or show the lengths we'll go to try to help. I want to talk about buying beds for an elderly woman with two grandchildren who'd been refused services by another organization. I want to talk about our Follow-up Services Coordinator taking her weed whacker to a client's trailer and helping her tame her overgrown yard so she wouldn't be evicted. Lately I want to talk about Lucy.

Lucy's person came to the shelter about a year ago. She had no children or close friends or family in the area. The only true companion she had was her dog, Lucy. The Department of Human Resources does not permit domestic violence shelters to house animals, so usually staff will work with vets, rescue agencies or volunteers to find a safe place for pets. In this situation however, the woman really wanted to visit Lucy frequently, something that would be difficult with our regular resources for fostering pets. To accommodate the request for frequent visits, one of Project Safe's staff members took Lucy home with her. That way she could more conveniently bring her to the shelter to see her person. Project Safe provided Lucy's food and flea treatment and took care of all her veterinary expenses. While in shelter, Lucy's person received case management, counseling, support groups, advocacy and assistance with housing and mental health treatment. It took ten months for the woman to move out of Continued on Page 3, Column 1=> the shelter and into a new apartment.

In Transition....

Two families are graduating this year from Project Safe's Transitional Housing Initiative. Both women have jobs, secure new apartments, and savings from their time in the program. Each of them was able to obtain valuable resources during their time in the Transitional Housing Initiative that will support them and their families as they continue to build on their success working with Project Safe. One of our graduates was able to receive a car through a grant from the Allstate Foundation. Our second graduate completed her degree at Athens Technical College while part of the program. We are very proud of all their hard work and accomplishments and wish them well!

The Transitional Housing Initiative began in 2005 as a way to provide qualified former shelter residents intensive long-term support with housing, childcare, education, and limited emergency financial aid. Transitional Housing clients work with Project Safe for two years; building skills that will help them live successful, independent lives. Currently, Project Safe has six units of housing in this program.

Donna Bracewell is Project Safe's Transitional Housing coordinator, and she is looking forward to working with the two new families who are taking the place of our graduates. One client would like to complete her degree at Athens Tech and to build budgeting and parenting skills. Another client has been in the program for about a month, and is still forming her goals. She wants to be able to raise her children on her own, but is not sure what path to take for long-term success. "In my opinion, the THI program is there to help victims who are motivated to become independent, but may be overwhelmed and not sure where to start," says Donna. She is working to help the client design a program to meet her needs during her two-year stay. These clients will be able to take advantage of THI's intensive support services to overcome obstacles they may face such as obtaining childcare, transportation, and counseling services for both themselves and their children.

Project Safe reaches children through Crossroads

As part of its work to end domestic violence, Project Safe provides a number of educational programs and trainings throughout the year. One of these is Crossroads, a specially designed curriculum that teaches 4th and 5th graders about anger management and domestic violence. Crossroad emphasizes two guiding principles: that you have a right to be safe from harm, and that you have a responsibility not to harm others.

The Crossroads program explores the guiding principles in three 45-minute lessons. Students participate in a fingerprint exercise to think about how each individual is unique, and talk about individual rights and self-esteem in the first lesson. In the second lesson, students learn healthy ways of expressing anger, and how to identify passive, assertive, and aggressive ways of expressing anger. Domestic violence and safety planning are the subjects of the final Crossroads lesson. This lesson discusses the different types of abuse and students learn specific safety skills such as staying out of a fight, numbers to call for help, and how to find a safe place in their home.

Project Safe has offered the Crossroads program in Madison, Clarke, and Oglethorpe County schools. After the program, 95% of students were able to express one or both of the underlying principles and could identify one or more individuals they could seek out for help if there was violence in their home. Eighty-nine percent also recognized examples of abusive behavior and expressed an understanding of safety planning. These results show that the Crossroads program can be an important resource for providing children with an understanding of domestic violence and ways to stay safe. During that time she came to believe that Lucy would be better off in a different environment, one with more room to run or perhaps other dogs or children. She asked that Project Safe help Lucy find a new family. Staff and volunteers put the word out, and almost one year to the day she arrived, Lucy moved in with a young couple. Both are graduate students at UGA with another rescue dog for Lucy to romp with. In their latest email they report that Lucy is enjoying trips to the dog park and playing Frisbee and ball with her new sibling.

"So what does Project Safe do?" (Answer: Whatever we can to try to help battered women and children escape the pain and humiliation of abuse and rebuild their lives. It may be shelter. It may be a temporary protective order. It may be pet care and kibble. It may be so unique to the individual calling on us for help that we don't know what it will be until we decide to try).
